
- ➤ MADISON VALLEY JUNE "HAPPENINGS" → Our strange new world continued through June, with most all events, meetings, public & social events cancelled, again. → Montana began Phase II with restaurant, bars, breweries, distilleries, and casinos allowed to open more completely. Restaurants were allowed to open for dining in. → There were a few Galleries open during the Art Walk. → There was a Gun Show, "Up in Arms" at the Madison County Fairgrounds. → The 14-day quarantine for out-of-staters was dropped. → Madison County has only had 8 cases and 1 death. Our neighboring Gallatin County still has the highest numbers in the state. → The Nearly New Shoppe reopened a few days a week. → The river was pretty clear and there were lots of boats on the river. → A few more businesses on Main Street are closed, but a few new ones opening. → The Madison River Regulations are still uncertain with the Fish and Wildlife Commission waiting until August to consider the EA for public comment.
- ➤ MADISON VALLEY JULY "HAPPENINGS" → Cancellations include the July 4th Pancake Breakfast, the Car Show, the Rodeo Parade and the VC Fireworks. The Rodeo is still scheduled. Ennis



Arts Association Art Show in the Park has been cancelled. → But the Pony Homecoming Club's 26th annual Poker Ride at the Sitz Angus Ranch is scheduled for the 20th at 37 Sitz Road in Harrison. \$30 to play and masks are required. http://www.madisoniannews.com/sports/pony-poker-ride-2020 → The Madison Theatre is still closed but the Ennis Fish Bowl is open for bowling! → If you are planning an event for 50 or more people, you are required plan on-line or in person to the Madison County Public Health Department.

➤ MONTANA NEWS → More personal contact among people, as the state economy reopens, and more

available testing has contributed to new COVID-19 cases hitting their second-highest weekly total in Montana, state health officials report. Although Montana has seen one of its biggest spikes in new COVID-19 recently, the Treasure State still has **one of the lowest infection rate of any state in the lower 48 states**. Dry fly season is in full swing and if you're a bobber lobber, yes, you will catch fish, but there are more interesting ways to fish.

As the month rolls along the big bugs will fade and the sallies, goldens and caddis of true Montana summer will fill in the space. This is going to be a great month to be on the river. - **WEATHER** → Typical June weather crazy! As soon as we plant our gardens and flower boxes, winter comes back! Our June daytime high was 88° and the daytime low was 47° . The nighttime high was 54° and the nighttime low was 33° . We generally settle into summer, come July!
- ➤ REAL ESTATE TIPS → WANT TO MOVE TO THE COUNTRY? With the current "Flight from Density" wave, more people are giving serious thought to quality of life issues. They are trading urban living for the wide-open spaces where social distancing just comes with the territory. But there are many things to consider before taking this life-changing step, particularly if you are planning to move to rural Montana, such as:



- 1. <u>Income.</u> Do you need to find employment, or will you have other income? Jobs will be fewer, wages lower and cost of living may even be higher, depending on the kind of area you choose.
- 2. <u>Utilities</u>. Many rural areas are off-the-grid and require alternative power systems, even when fiber optic cable may be available. Properties outside of city limits will require septic systems and wells. These are all extra costs when buying vacant land.
- 3. <u>Services</u>. Most rural areas provide only volunteer services for fire and ambulance. Property owners haul their own trash to central county dumps. County roads may or may not be maintained or plowed in the winter. Law enforcement is not as visible. Hospitals and clinics may not be convenient. Neighbors depend upon each other.
- 4. <u>Transportation.</u> There is no public transportation and personal vehicles need to be rugged, 4-wheel types, with good tires.
- 5. <u>People.</u> Newcomers to rural areas can be as private and isolated as they choose, or they can jump in and participate in the many local clubs and activities. Locals are generally welcoming to people who want to take an active part in their community, so long as they leave their old attitudes and ways behind, where they came from, and embrace the reasons they moved! Listen and learn! People will be talking about the issues and politics of the area. Take the community pulse. Don't be the new person coming in and trying to apply your big-city viewpoint to a place with its own unique history. And, in small towns, many people are related or connected somehow. It is helpful to recognize this and learn the connections! Safer too!
- 6. **Respect**. Living in the country means paying a great deal of respect to plants, wildlife, and your fellow man. Be prepared to share your land and sometimes, the road with all manner of wildlife. Your neighbors are also here to enjoy the peace and tranquility of rural living. It is important to respect the space, wishes and desires of your neighbors as well. Maintaining your property and avoiding activities that may pollute nearby water, air or land is an important part of living in the country.

The benefits to living in the country are vast, and for many people, completely worth any sacrifice. The peacefulness of rural living and the great outdoors awaits you. ➤ CURRENT REAL ESTATE NEWS → WASHINGTON (June 29, 2020) – Pending home sales mounted a record comeback in May, seeing encouraging contract activity after two previous months of declines brought on by the coronavirus pandemic, according to the National Association of Realtors®. Every major region recorded an increase in month-over-month pending home sales transactions, while the South also experienced a year-over-year increase in pending transactions.

The Pending Home Sales Index (PHSI), a forward-looking indicator of home sales based on contract signings, rose 44.3% to 99.6 in May, chronicling the highest month-over-month gain in the index since NAR started this series in January 2001. Year-over-year, contract signings fell 5.1%. An index of 100 is equal to the level of contract activity in 2001.

"This has been a spectacular recovery for contract signings, and goes to show the resiliency of American consumers and their evergreen desire for homeownership," said Lawrence Yun, NAR's chief economist. "This bounce back also speaks to how the housing sector could lead the way for a broader economic recovery. More listings are continuously appearing as the economy reopens, helping with inventory choices," Yun said. "Still, more home construction is needed to counter the persistent underproduction of homes over the past decade."

"The outlook has significantly improved, as new home sales are expected to be higher this year than last, and annual existing-home sales are now projected to be down by less than 10% – even after missing the spring buying season due to the pandemic lockdown," Yun said. NAR now expects existing-home sales to reach 4.93 million units in 2020 and new home sales to hit 690,000. "All figures light up in 2021 with positive GDP, employment, housing starts and home sales." Yun noted that in 2021, sales are forecast to rise to 5.35 million units for existing homes and 800,000 for new homes.

The month of May saw each of the four regional indices rise on a month-over-month basis after all were down in April 2020. The Northeast PHSI grew 44.4% to 61.5 in May, although it was still down 33.2% from a year ago. In the Midwest, the index rose 37.2% to 98.8 last month, down 1.4% from May 2019. Pending home sales in the South increased 43.3% to an index of 125.5 in May, up 1.9% from May 2019. The index in the West jumped 56.2% in May to 89.2, down 2.5% from a year ago.

Big Sky Country Multiple Listing statistics for the Madison Valley area (including Ennis, Cameron, McAllister, Norris, Virginia City, Harrison, Pony), for the month of JUNE 2020, were as follows:
- **HOMES:** 53↑ homes listed (\$149,900 to \$2,990,000); 21↑ pending sales (\$75,000 to \$999,999); and 31 homes have sold in 2020 (\$130,000 to \$1,325,000), totaling \$14,211,800 at 97.4%↑ of list prices.
- **LAND:** 186 \downarrow vacant lots listed (\$16,250 to \$1,950,000; with 35 \uparrow pending sales (\$9,500 to \$385,000); and 45 lots have sold in 2020 (\$8,000 to \$569,000), totaling \$5,206,880 at 92.9% \uparrow of list prices.
- **RANCHES:** 7 ranches listed (\$599,000 to \$15,900,000); 1 pending sale (\$1,350,000), and 1 ranch has sold in 2020 (\$4,000,000), at 89% of list price.
- **COMMERCIAL:** 16↓ listed (\$56,000 to \$950,000); 1 pending sale (\$108,000); and 1 commercial property has sold in 2020 (\$100,000), at 91% of list price.

MONTANA TRIVIA...Did you know... that Montana was hit hard with the Spanish Flu? According to the Montana Historical Society, during the influenza pandemic of 1918-1919, Montana was one of the four hardest hit states in the nation. More than 5,000 people - about 1% of the state's population - died during the outbreak. And no reports of hoarding medicine and toilet paper were included in daily newspapers during the Spanish Flu pandemic! In 2020, as of mid-April, Montana reported just over 400 cases of COVID-19 with eight deaths, which was a far cry from the 640,000 cases and more than 28,000 deaths elsewhere in the nation. Some parallels can be made between the two pandemics. There was confusion, conflicts between business interests and authorities, and indecision by those entrusted to safeguard public health. Like the COVID-19 outbreak, the Spanish Flu was thought to have originated in China as a virus that mutated from an animal infection to one that can be transmitted to and through humans. It also was similar in that it attacked the respiratory system, with a form of pneumonia that often was the actual cause of death. Most who died were between 18 and 40 years old. State and local leaders urged churches, restaurants, saloons, schools, and other gathering places to close, but that was met with hostility. Still, the closures took place, although some food and drink sales were allowed if the items were consumed off site. Sounds familiar. At one point, these restrictions were urged to be lifted because no one knew how the flu was actually transmitted, and the closures were hurting businesses.

The stories of Montanans pulling together are legendary. While it ran its course, Montana was focused on the conclusion of WWI and the peace negotiations. It is just possible that the influenza experience reinforced Montana's desire after the war to isolate itself, to look inward, to find a sense of balance and to see a place from which to survey a broken world. https://missoulian.com/news/local/all-of-montana-suffered-in-1918-19-spanish-flu-pandemic/article_41612c0e-66bf-5d68-9971-90d50c46e006.html
